#### Home Is Where the Heart Is.

A building doesn't make a home. It is customary in my Luhya culture for a young man to leave the home of his mother as he enters manhood. Often boys band together and build a house, but I was proud. I wanted my own place. My father directed me to a spot near an old abandoned settler's house, which was overgrown and reputed to be infested with poisonous snakes.

In Kenya, there are snakes so venomous, when bitten one is dead before he hits the ground. I endeavored to conceal my trepidations, but behind a sly smile, am sure my father sensed my fears.

Alone I cleared the area, cut the briars, and removed the stones. I felled acacia trees and hewed them into beams and cut rafters. I dug holes and erected posts to establish the framework. Lastly I gathered grasses and thatched the roof as I had helped my late father do many times before. Though I was proud of my endeavors, this house was never a home.

When I finished High School, on a rickety bicycle I sought additional education in many places. Overtime, I laid my head in many places, sometimes out doors, but seldom in a place I would dignify as a home.

It is said, "Home is where the heart is." I found myself traveling the same way from work each day with a pretty girl. It must have taken planning and courage for that pretty girl to ask me if I would like to have tea with her, and when she did, I said "No." Because I could see by her bearing that she was of a higher class than I, the son of a poor farmer and mason. I berated myself fiercely, but luckily enough she asked again and that time I had the common sense to accept her invitation.

When I became an Anglican priest, Jane and I lived in many parishes. Each place has been a home because of her. One place I can remember we lived in a building with only a partial roof. Our sons, Chris, Dennis and Hudson were just babies then, but with love encompassing our young family, it was indeed a home.

Finally, we purchased a plot of land. Together Jane and I built our own house. She handed building material up to me until weariness overtook her. But our determination did fashion our own home on our own land.

When I entered Trinity House on Monday, September 8, 2014, I was shocked into speechlessness. What occurred during my vacation to visit my wife and my home in Kenya was miraculous. Loving hands and hearts had come together to build a home. It is amazing how this church family worked together to build this miracle. Without losing focus and departing from a straight line, this accomplishment was attained in such a short time. I can only compare it to the rebuilding of the walls of the second Temple in Jerusalem. Together we will build a strong church.

A home is indeed where the heart is. Though part of my heart is with Jane and my sons in Kenya, love cannot be measured. Just as God's love, it is boundless. My heart is here.
