May the New Year bring us...

Enough happiness to keep us sweet; Enough trials to keep us strong; Enough hope to keep us lively; Enough sorrows to keep us dependent upon God; Enough failure to keep us humble; Enough success to keep us eager; Enough friends to give us comfort; Enough wealth to meet our needs; Enough enthusiasm to keep us looking forward; Enough faith to overcome despair; And enough determination to use every day and situation somehow for good. It's called Karma.

This year I decided to get involved in the Thanksgiving meals.

About a month before Thanksgiving, I sent out the word to Trinity members that we needed turkeys. We received 9 turkeys, lots of sides, and money toward the baskets. We also received money for a family that had no clothes for their three children.

I went shopping for clothes and for food for Thanksgiving. Between the food that was donated and the food I purchased, I was able to fill the baskets with turkeys, stuffing, cornbread, gravy, cranberry sauce, green beans, corn, rolls, applesauce, chicken broth, sweet potatoes, and pumpkin pie.

I called back the 9 families that had asked for help and I told them to come by on the Friday before Thanksgiving. Each and every one of them were so grateful for all that was given to them.

There were two families that had no way of picking up the food. One was a woman, who had asked if there was any way someone could bring it to her. When I told her I didn't think I could find someone, she said "that's ok dear," and I told her I would call her back. I hung up the phone and thought about her three children having no food for their Thanksgiving meal.

I thought there had to be a way to get the food to her. I spoke with Diane Hair and the two of us packed up the car and went that afternoon.

I never thought that bringing a basket of food to a total stranger would change the way that I looked at Thanksgiving.

She was so grateful for the food we gave her. She began to cry and tell us her life story. She grew up in foster care, until her grandmother ended up adopting her. She now lives with her three children, one of whom is autistic. Her husband works in Philadelphia, and comes home when he can. She has no car and relies on her neighbors to take her places. Currently she is suffering from cancer for a second time. She has had multiple surgeries and doesn't like taking pain medication because it hinders her ability to take care of her children. With very little money, no food, no help, being sick and not knowing what will happen to her, she was so grateful for the little we did for her that day.

I left her apartment that rainy afternoon, looking at my life a lot differently from when I had walked in. I started thinking about how thankful I am for all I have. For my health, my family, my home, my friends, my job, and food on my table. Just helping this one stranger changed my thoughts and feelings.

This new year, help someone out. It will make you feel better about yourself. It will connect you with another person, maybe for a moment, if not for life. It may improve the life of another. It may make the world a better place, and if that kindness is passed on it can multiply.
