Welcoming Strangers [Part 1]

Hebrew 13:1

September 1, 2019, Our Scripture Lesson was from Luke 14:1,7-14; and since then I have been thinking about acts of kindness that have continued in our parish since the 150th Anniversary of our Diocese of Easton. Many have shared wonderful things- Acts of mercy especially strangers. In thinking about the lesson for last week, at first glance, Jesus' parable about how to select a seat at such banquets might seem like a glorified manners lesson. He suggests that his fellow guests should choose the lowest place when they attend a feast so that they might be invited up to a higher place.

Jesus' parable isn't a manners lesson, however; it's an invitation from God to receive a genuine blessing. But the blessing doesn't come in the way his fellow guests expected. The blessing does not come by seeking the place of honor, because that is not participating in God's mercy and love. It does not come by inviting only those who will return the favor, because that is not a faithful witness. The blessing, Jesus says, will come by hosting the people who aren't normally invited to the table.

In Jesus' time, those people were the poor, the crippled, the lame and the blind, the ones on the margins of society, the ones who never expected to be invited to a feast.

In today's culture, whom would Jesus tell us to invite to the feast?

Jesus reminds us that there's no immediate reward, but if you invite these people now, it is investment in your future: your ultimate future. He tells his dinner companions they will receive a blessing from God if they simply reinvent what it means to invite all of us to the table. Jesus' parable invites them and us to take a hard look at how we treat people from whom there is no expected dividend.

When we extend radical hospitality and kindness, God blesses us both *here* and in the *future*. In effect, Jesus was telling those at the table with him that radical hospitality was an expression of righteous living.

Jesus' message wasn't just for the Pharisees, of course; it's also for us too. When we live as a blessing to our community, it draws us into relationship with people who Jesus said have an important place in the kingdom of God. In so doing, we begin to live into God's desire for this world, which is for us to love our neighbors as ourselves. Who knows what we will experience when we reach past the walls that divide, when we make the effort to be a blessing to others.

On July 2, 2019 at 9:37 am, a stranger in a car with Pennsylvania tags parked in front of the Rectorate. He asked me if the church was open so that he could go in and pray. Having worked on my flower bed since 6:30 am I was hesitant to say yes for I did not know how long he would take for I needed to leave for other business! But within me there was that voice saying, just open it for him.

I entered the Rectorate, took my keys and took him over to church and let him in. Two hours later he had not finished praying. After another hour I lost patience and decided that I was going to tell him that I needed to close the church. It was getting late for my meeting. When I opened the door of the house, the car that was parked outside was gone. I went to the church, closed the doors and went out to continue with my business of the day.

Days later, the Altar Guild found a twenty-dollar bill on the altar. I remembered the stranger. The dividend was within the same week!

This is a good time to consider how and to whom God is calling us to extend banquet invitations. Let us not neglect to show hospitality to strangers for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.
